a) Constituent Assembly and Interim Legislature (1947). The Constituent Assembly of Pakistan was established in August 1947, with the primary tasks of framing a constitution and serving as an interim parliament. The assembly was formed based on the Indian Independence Act of 1947 and had its first session on August 10, 1947, at the Sindh Assembly building in Karachi. Muhammad Ali Jinnah was elected as the president of the Constituent Assembly on August 11, 1947. The assembly passed the Objectives Resolution on March 12, 1949, which outlined the aims and objectives of the future constitution. The Objectives Resolution laid the foundation for Pakistan's future constitutions and established the country's identity as an Islamic republic.

b) First Constitution in 1956. Pakistan's first constitution was adopted on March 23, 1956. The Constituent Assembly was dissolved in March 1956 and succeeded by the Parliament of Pakistan. This constitution marked a significant milestone in Pakistan's history, establishing it as a federal republic with a parliamentary system of government. The 1956 constitution provided for a bicameral legislature, with a National Assembly and a Senate, and established the office of the President as the head of state. However, the constitution was short-lived and was abrogated in 1958 following a military coup led by General Ayub Khan.

The crisis that followed led to the Bangladesh Liberation War and ultimately resulted in the separation of East Pakistan, which became Bangladesh in December 1971. The crisis highlighted the deep-seated regional and ethnic divisions within Pakistan and led to a re-evaluation of the country's governance structure.

e) 1973: Adoption of the Third Constitution. The 1973 constitution was adopted on August 14, 1973, and established a parliamentary system of government. The constitution declared Islam as the state religion and provided for a bicameral legislature. The 1973 constitution has undergone several amendments, including the 18th Amendment. The constitution established a federal system of government, with power divided between the center and the provinces. It also provided for an independent judiciary and established fundamental rights for citizens.

f) 18th Amendment to the Constitution of Pakistan. The 18th Amendment to the Constitution of Pakistan was passed in 2010 and made significant changes to the constitution. The amendment:

- Strengthened the parliamentary system and reduced the power of the president
